BEST, Inc Receives Second Apprenticeship Expansion Grant!

BEST, Inc (Illinois Local Workforce Area 4) requested just shy of \$175,000 – the cap for grant requests and received approval for \$110,000 max. Grant is for a one year period with the possibility of extending it for up to an additional 4 years in June 2024. The purpose is to provide technical assistance to area companies/businesses in the development of apprenticeship programs that address company/business workforce needs. Technical Assistance Outreach covers 8 counties that BEST serves: Bureau, Carroll, Jo Daviess, La Salle, Lee, Ogle, Putnam, and Whiteside. BEST will also serve as a liaison to connect companies/businesses to the US Department of Labor Region 5 Office of Apprenticeship.

This is the first year of this round of Apprenticeship Expansion Grant, grant Period is July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. Illinois can apply for an additional 4 years through competitive bid in 2024. During this first year staff will hold an additional 6 industry sector events to promote the development of new programs and the expansion of existing programs. Staff anticipate the standup of at least 1 additional program besides the ones at Jo Carroll Energy and Wolfline Construction. Staff also anticipate reaching 179 companies across all sectors based on their performance during their 2019 Apprenticeship Expansion Grant. The agency hopes to be able to apply for and receive additional funding during the 2024 bidding process so that it can expand programs such as those covered by the current grant as well as put more virtual resource (VR) career exploration tools in area schools.

Grant Will Cover:

- Targeted Population Hiring Incentive \$2,000.00 -- \$250 per eligible hire based on the local definition of a targeted population (Veteran, Disabled, Returning Citizen) for a max of \$1000.00 per employer. 2 employers max. \$35,906.00 Initial purchase of training materials for the National Broadband Association's training. See attached for detailed/itemized breakout of costs.
- \$999.00 Train the Trainer cost for 1 trainer is expected to be \$499 and conducted by the National Broadband Association. Travel expenses are estimated at an additional \$500.
- \$25,830 Half of first year of apprenticeship training for Wolfline Construction for 5 students is estimated at \$14,330 (\$2,866 per student for 1 semester). Training cost for 12 students through the National Broadband Association curriculum is estimated at \$5,400 (12 students at \$450 each). = 19,730.00. Virtual Reality Career Exploration Tools for Pipeline Feeder Effort \$6,100 Two Virtual Reality Goggles for CTE students career exploration in fiber broadband at \$600 each for a total of \$1,200.00. Development of 10 experiences for the virtual goggles \$4,400.
- Cloud hosting for virtual experiences for 10 months at \$50/month. \$500.00
- Staff cost for providing business engagement and technical assistance to remaining LWIA 4 counties.

Worth Repeating! What is WorkShare IL?

WorkShare IL is a voluntary program that provides employers, facing a decline in business, with an alternative to layoffs. The program allows an employer to reduce the hours of workers in any unit of their business in order to avoid permanent layoffs of workers. Each worker in an affected unit continues to work, but experiences a reduction in hours that ranges from 20% to 60%. Workers receive a portion of their unemployment benefits during the period of the temporary reduction to offset the reduction in earnings.
